
## Conservation of Hurd's Pond gets major boost

**W**e like to get letters like the one we received last July from Ethan Bessey, asking if we would be interested in acquiring some of his family's land near Hurd's Pond in Swanville. As a matter of fact, we would! E.D. Bessey & Son, a locally-owned, family-run timber company, owns land in two critical places: our Hurd's Pond Focal Area and our Meadow Brook Region of Interest. This was good news for our expanding Meadow Brook Preserve.

The Bessey family has been in Maine since around the time of the Revolution, and they take quality forestry very seriously. Their company has operations in Maine and New Hampshire, though they buy logs from the rest of New England to sell all over the world. On its own land in Maine, the company employs logging contractors who live near the harvest sites. The contractors take a long-term interest in the land they harvest, knowing that they too will benefit from an improved future forest. Bessey allows unrestricted public access to their woodlands, as is traditional in New England. They were founding members of Project Landshare, a Maine program that encourages private landowners to allow public access and recognizes them for doing so.

When Scott Dickerson, our Land Acquisitions Coordinator, began the conversation with Ethan Bessey last summer, he pointed out our interest in the 160-acre parcel across the road from the land they originally offered for sale. The Besseys were quick to change course.

Although they were currently harvesting that parcel, the deal came together over the next several months. The Besseys agreed to reduce the area they planned to harvest in order to better protect the property's mature forest stands and provide a more robust buffer to Meadow Brook and its wetlands. With gener-



ous support from an anonymous donor and the Maine Community Foundation's Pollinator's Fund, we'll close on the property this month.

The 160 acres we will purchase, the third tract of the Meadow Brook Preserve, is an ecological complement to our Meadow Brook

Preserve and its encompassing Hurd's Pond Focal Area. The parcel abuts the western edge of the 162-acre Hawk-Fry Tract of the preserve, and it will expand protection of the wetland system, deer wintering areas, and inland wading bird habitat. The area has been designated by the state as a Wildlife Management Area and as High Value Inland Wading Bird and Wildlife Habitat by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (IF&W) and the Department of Environmental Protection, respectively. As the Meadow Brook Preserve grows, thorough planning for the entire Hurd's Pond Focal Area is supported by funding from the Maine Community Foundation's Fund for Maine Land Conservation, and with advisory help from Maine Coast Heritage Trust. With our partners, the Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition and IF&W, we'll begin planning public access opportunities on this pristine and undeveloped pond, including non-motorized boat access, hiking trails, and cross-country skiing opportunities: a triumph for outdoor recreation and a major victory for land conservation.

## Scott Dickerson honored with Espy Land Heritage Award

**W**e are proud to announce that our former Executive Director, Scott Dickerson, was honored with the 2014 Espy Land Heritage Award at this year's Maine Land Conference on April 26. Doug Sensenig, our current Director, accepted the award on Scott's behalf (with help from Board and staff) while Scott enjoyed a well-deserved two-month sojourn across the American West with his wife Janet and their dog Mizuna. The award was presented by Maine Coast Heritage Trust (MCHT), a statewide land conservation organization that coordinates the annual conference for Maine land trusts. Each year MCHT presents the Espy Land Heritage Award to an individual, organization, or coalition for exemplary conservation efforts in Maine. Named for MCHT's former President Jay Espy, the award celebrates and honors Espy's own vision, leadership, and collaboration for land conservation.

"Scott has worked long and hard to ensure that his land trust not only accomplished a number of impressive conservation projects, but also has much of the knowledge, capabilities, and resources to carry the trust's work forward over the long haul," said Tim Glidden, President of MCHT, as he presented the award. "His hard work, intelligence, and maybe just the right amount of (continued on page 2)

(continued from page 1) stubbornness has resulted in a conservation legacy that has made an enormous difference in Maine.”


Scott served as our director for 16 years before retiring from that position in February. Over the course of his career, he increased the amount of our conserved land from 2,000 to almost 10,000 acres. He formed a 26-member coalition to protect the Ducktrap River, launched a campaign to protect Bald and Ragged Mountains, oversaw the rehabilitation of the 100-year-old stone hut on Beech Hill, and began a partnership with the City of Belfast that will yield a rails-to-trails project.

“Thank you to everyone at Maine Coast Heritage Trust for this honor, which is actually a collective award earned by all who work together to accomplish land conservation,” said Dickerson upon acknowledging the award. “Ambitious supporters, volunteers, board members, and staff are the key ingredients of this award.”

Along with the honor of receiving the award, recipients are granted \$5,000, which the winner directs to the conservation charity of their choice. Scott chose to divide the cash award to benefit three recipients: the Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition, to honor Cloe Chunn; the Friends of Sears Island, to honor Marietta Ramsdell - both key founders of their respective organizations; and Coastal Mountains Land Trust, to support its permanent land conservation achievements.

While Scott’s accomplishments and leadership never went unnoticed, we’re proud to have his effort recognized at the state level. But he’s not finished yet. Scott is still on staff as our Land Acquisitions Coordinator. He’ll continue to guide our future acquisitions with the same tenacity and patience that he’s had all along.

## Beech Nut turns 100!

2014 marks the 100th anniversary of Beech Nut, the stone hut at the top of our Beech Hill Preserve in Rockport. Built in 1914, the hut has evolved from family teahouse to a crumbling ruin and back to a fully rehabilitated community landmark. Now we want to celebrate the hut, and you’re invited!

On Friday, June 27 from 4:00 to 6:00 PM we’ll throw Beech Nut a birthday party. Ice cream will be available for purchase from Stone Fox Farm Creamery, made locally in Monroe. Local musician Ken Barnes will grace the hill with his bagpipes, and we’ll have cake and lemonade on hand to help us celebrate.

In addition to the birthday party, we’ll have 100th Anniversary commemorative posters and notecards on sale. Local artist Anneli Skaar of Skaar Design generously donated the poster design in honor of Beech Nut’s centennial. The 18”x 24” posters will be on sale for \$25 each; packs of eight 4”x 6” notecards are \$10. These limited edition images will be available to purchase at the Beech Nut birthday party and throughout the summer at our office and farm stand. Net proceeds will benefit our land conservation program.

Finally, later this year in November, Carver Hill Gallery in Rockland will feature a Contours Benefit Art Show. Beginning on Friday, November 7 during November’s First Friday Art Walk, the benefit art show will feature works by various artists inspired by Beech Hill. The show will run until Sunday, November 23, and net proceeds from the show will benefit the Land Trust.




Pictured here in around 1916, Beech Nut celebrates its 100th year in 2014.

Earlier this year we purchased a 15-acre tract near Ragged Mountain’s ridgeline that hosts a section of the Georges Highland Path. This property is now permanently protected as part of the Ragged Mountain Preserve. In addition, many diligent volunteers have been helping us create a new trailhead for the popular Bald Mountain Trail at the northwest corner of Barnestown and Gillette Roads. The official, celebratory trail opening will be held on Thursday, July 17, 3:00 – 4:00 PM.

## Art and nature unite at Beech Nut

Beech Nut will look a little different to those who visit the stone hut in the month of July. George Mason, a Damariscotta-based sculptor and artist, will install his relief tapestries on the interior walls of the building to begin a conversation between art and nature, people and place. Last year George approached the Land Trust: “When I walked into this great stone and sod roof building, with beautifully restored timbers and vaulted ceiling, there was a ‘going quiet’ within me. This has happened before in Jerusalem or within the secure depths of the Maine woods in January. There is simply a still and dynamic presence in Beech Nut, and it is nourishing. While there is nothing that needs to be added to this, when I experienced the building and its resplendent view of Penobscot Bay, I knew I wanted to interact with this setting.”

George worked collaboratively with us to design an exhibit that would do just that. Incorporating color, texture, light, and shadow into his large tapestries, George will hang

his work to invite visitors to engage with the depth of tranquility found at Beech Nut.

George’s background is in ceramic architectural tile. A recipient of three National Endowment for the Arts awards and founder of Watershed Center for Ceramic Arts, George has taught extensively around the country and, in Maine, shown at the Portland Museum of Art and the Center for Maine Contemporary Art, with solo shows at the Farnsworth Art Museum and the Bowdoin College Museum of Art.

During the month of July, visitors are invited to join George for a special open house series. George’s work comes to Beech Nut as part of the Land Trust’s new Arts on the Hill program at Beech Hill. Artists and

## Harvest season is almost here!



What's a Maine summer without a handful (or a pie-full!) of fresh blueberries? We don't want to know. Once again we will be selling our MOFGA-certified, hand-raked organic blueberries by the quart at the Beech Hill farm stand. Located in the Beech Hill Road parking lot of the preserve, the farm stand will be open 11:00 AM – 5:00 PM daily, as weather and harvest permit, from mid-July into August. Top off your hike up scenic Beech Hill with a visit to the farm stand for fresh blueberries, books, prints, maps, and hats, all available for purchase. All proceeds from farm stand sales stay "on the hill" and help sustain bird habitat, open views, and public access, as well as our year-round events there. ## You can get there from here!

As of July, there will be a new way to access our Bald Mountain Preserve. Thanks to the generosity of the Pendleton family, last year we acquired a two-acre lot at the crest of Barnestown Road in Camden for conversion to a new, safer parking area for the Bald Mountain trailhead. As a result, the summit trail has been slightly rerouted, and the former parking lot has been closed. We'll all gather there on Thursday, July 17 from 3:00 – 4:00 PM to officially open the new parking lot and explore the new trail. If you can't join us then, the driving directions are still the same: the new parking area is just a few hundred feet up hill from the former one, on the other side of the road. Ian Stewart, our Stewardship Director, will lead a short walk on the new trail section. Participants are welcome to continue on to the summit of Bald Mountain from there – a worthwhile trek on a summer afternoon!
